Inspection of your farm is done to assure the public that your farm is operating in compliance with Vermont dairy law. Your inspector will leave the inspection report in the milk house or with you or your farm representative. If possible, your inspector will review the report with you or your farm representative at the end of the inspection.

#### Inspection

Once the Agency learns that a farm is selling unpasteurized milk, an Agency Dairy Inspector will inspect the farm to see if it is operating in compliance with 6 V.S.A. Chapter 152. Subsequent inspections will be conducted as needed. Once the farm is in compliance, inspection will occur on an annual basis.

#### **Violations**

If the Agency Dairy Inspector observes Items that are substantially out of compliance, the inspection will be noted as not passing and the Agency Dairy Inspector will write the approximate re-inspection date for each Item in the Comments section above. If Items have different re-inspection dates, inspection will take place after the closest date for re-inspection. Items with a later re-inspection date observed to be out of compliance at that time will be debited but no action will be taken on them until their re-inspection date.

### **Repeat Violations**

Upon re-inspection, if the noted Items are not corrected, the Agency will issue to the farm a notice of violation with a proposed monetary penalty of not less than \$250.00 per violation and not more than \$25,000.00 of total penalties. The farm may request a hearing on the notice of violation. Upon receipt of the notice of violation, the farm must stop selling unpasteurized milk until it receives written notification from the Agency that it can start selling unpasteurized milk again.

### **Inappropriate Sales**

Vermont dairy law only allows a farm to sell unpasteurized (or raw) milk for personal consumption. It does not allow a farm to sell unpasteurized milk to restaurants or commercial entities. It does not allow a farm to sell milk products (like cheese) without a 6 V.S.A. Chapter 151 Milk Handler License. It requires that milk products for sale are made in an Agency-inspected facility. If a farm is found selling unpasteurized milk into commerce or selling unpasteurized milk products without a Chapter 151 Milk Handler License, the farm must stop immediately or any violation may be multiplied by the number of days it continues to sell after it received notice to stop. Examples of selling "into commerce" include selling in or to stores, farmer markets, or restaurants. If a farm continues to sell after receiving a written warning, the Agency will issue a notice of violation with a proposed penalty of not less than \$500.00 per product and not more than \$25,000.00 in total penalties. The farm may request a hearing on the notice of violation. Upon receipt of the notice of violation, the farm must stop selling unpasteurized milk upon receiving the notice of violation until it receives written notification from the Agency that it can start selling unpasteurized milk again.

## **Food Safety Issues**

If the Agency Dairy Inspector observes Items that are substantially out of compliance with Vermont dairy law and the Agency determines that this substantial noncompliance presents a food safety issue under 6 V.S.A. § 21, the Agency will notify the farm that it must immediately stop selling unpasteurized milk. The farm must not sell unpasteurized milk until it receives written notification from the Agency that it can start selling unpasteurized milk again.

Please note that for your farm to meet inspection requirements of 6 V.S.A. Chapter 152, inspection must be conducted by an Agency Dairy Inspector.
