

Food Safety Modernization Act Produce Safety Rule **Qualified Exemption Annual Review & Verification Worksheet**

A farm is eligible for a qualified exemption under the Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) Produce Safety Rule (21 CFR § 112) if the farm's annual food sales are less than \$500,000, averaged over the previous <u>3 years</u> and <u>adjusted for inflation</u> AND a majority of these sales are to **qualified end-users**.

This worksheet may be used to meet the requirement in 21 CFR § 112.7(b) that states "you must establish and keep adequate records necessary to demonstrate that your farm satisfies the criteria for a qualified exemption ... including a written record reflecting that you have performed an annual review and verification of your farm's continued eligibility for the qualified exemption."

To support this record, retain all records used to determine calculations for the annual review. See reverse for definitions and inflation-adjusted figures.

Definitions 21 CFR § 112.3

Food: (1) articles used for food or drink for man or other animals, (2) chewing gum, and (3) articles used for components of any such article.

Food Sales: All food sales from the farm, including human and animal food.

Qualified End-User: The consumer of the food OR a restaurant or retail food establishment located in the same state as the farm that produced the food or within 275 miles of the farm.

Examples of qualified end-users include, but are not limited to, the following when the end-user is located in the same state or within 275 miles of the farm:

- CSA shareholder
- Farm stand
- Grocery store
- Restaurant

Modified Requirements for farms that are eligible for a qualified exemption

Labeling: A farm eligible for a qualified exemption from the Produce Safety Rule must notify consumers as to the complete business address of the farm where the food is grown, harvested, packed, or held. The compliance date for this requirement is January 1, 2020.

If your farm is eligible for a qualified exemption, you must comply with certain modified requirements and keep documentation as per sections 112.6 and 112.7 in the rule, including the following subparts:

- 1. Subpart A (General Provisions)
- 2. Subpart O (Records)
- 3. Subpart Q (Compliance and Enforcement)
- 4. Subpart R (Withdrawal of Qualified Exemption)

These subparts can be reviewed via the Electronic Code of Federal Regulations (Standards for the Growing, Harvesting, Packing, and Holding of Produce for Human Consumption). You can also link to the rule from https://go.usa.gov/xQgKv (case sensitive).

Vermont Produce Portal

Enrolling will allow you to access resources including regular policy and news updates on produce safety requirements, the opportunity to request an On-Farm Readiness Review, and eligibility to apply for Vermont Produce Safety Improvement Grants to help pay for on-farm improvements.



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
